The Article...the main goal of this Article, which is the guts of the Bill, is to stimulate management and make necessary corrections before weaknesses in an agency become a scandal. This is a difficult...I can ima...I understand why the Governor vetoed this. Whether it was a Republican, Democrat or Independent Governor, they will probably veto it because it does put a tremendous responsibility onto the member...or onto the leaders of the agency. I do believe that it belongs there. The federal agencies have similar requirements. It puts the Director of an agency on the spot. He has to say, 'Here's what they told me was wrong and here's what I've done to correct it and here's what I'm about to do.' Many times the audits come in, the Directors do little or nothing about it, it goes on from one to another. I would ask for my colleagues to override the Governor's Amendatory Veto on House Bill
